1. General information

Health Interactions Limited (“the company”) is a private company limited by shares, incorporated under the Companies Act 2006 in the United Kingdom. The company is registered and domiciled in England and the address of its registered office is Admiral House, 76-78 Old Street, London, EC1V 9AZ. The principal activity of the company is as set out in the Directors’ Report.

2. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), including Financial Reporting Standard 101 “Reduced Disclosure Framework” (FRS 101) and the requirements of the Companies Act 2006, as applicable to companies subject to the small companies regime.

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis and in accordance with applicable accounting standards. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

These financial statements are presented in sterling, which is the functional currency of the company and are rounded to the nearest £000, unless otherwise stated.

The company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions under FRS 101:

- a) the requirements of IFRS 7 “Financial Instruments: Disclosures”;
- b) the requirements of paragraphs 91-99 of IFRS 13 “Fair Value Measurement”;
- c) the requirement in paragraph 38 of IAS 1 “Presentation of Financial Statements” to present comparative information in respect of paragraph 73(e) of IAS 16 “Property, Plant and Equipment”;
- d) the requirements of paragraphs 10(d) and 134-136 of IAS 1;
- e) the requirements of IAS 7 “Statement of Cash Flows”;
- f) the requirements of paragraphs 30 and 31 of IAS 8 “Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors”;
- g) the requirements of paragraph 17 of IAS 24 “Related Party Disclosures”; and
- h) the requirements in IAS 24 to disclose related party transactions entered into between two or more members of a group, provided that any subsidiary which is a party to the transaction is wholly owned by such a member.

Where relevant, equivalent disclosures have been given in the group accounts of Nucleus Holdings Limited, which are available to the public from the address above.

Going concern

The directors are satisfied and have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the annual financial statements.

Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment. Depreciation is provided on all property, plant and equipment, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight-line basis over its expected useful life, as follows:

Taxation

The tax expense represents the sum of the current tax expense and deferred tax expense. Current tax assets are recognised when tax paid exceeds the tax payable.

Current tax is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from total comprehensive income because it excludes items of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other periods. Current tax assets and liabilities are measured using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

Deferred tax is calculated at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or the liability is settled based on tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date. Deferred tax is not discounted.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised in respect of all timing differences that exist at the reporting date. Timing differences are differences between taxable profits and total comprehensive income that arise from the inclusion of income and expenses in tax assessments in different periods from their recognition in the financial statements. Deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered by the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits.

Current tax assets and current tax liabilities and deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset, if and only if, there is a legally enforceable right to set off the amounts and the entity intends either to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Foreign currency

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate of exchange at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the balance sheet date are reported at the rates of exchange prevailing at that date. All differences are included in profit or loss.

Long-term contracts

Long-term contracts are assessed on a contract by contract basis and reflected in profit or loss by recording revenue and related costs as contract activity progresses. Revenue recognised in the accounts reflects the stage of completion of the contract, and credit taken for profit earned to date when the outcome of the contract can be assessed with reasonable certainty. The amount by which revenue exceeds payments on account is classified as "amounts recoverable on contracts" and included in trade and other receivables; to the extent that payments on account exceed relevant revenue, the excess is included in trade and other payables.

Revenue

Revenue represents the invoiced value, net of Value Added Tax, of goods sold and services provided to customers and, in the case of long-term contracts, credit is taken appropriate to the stage of completion when the outcome of the contract can be assessed with reasonable certainty. Revenue is recognised in line with the policy on long-term contracts.

In the current year the Group has applied IFRS 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers. IFRS 15 requires that revenue from contracts with customers be recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which an entity expects to be entitled in exchange for providing services to a customer.

The Group adopted IFRS 15 using the modified retrospective method applying the standard to all contracts as at 1 January 2018. The model has not changed the timing of revenue recognition of the Group as management had already recognised and applied key aspects of the standard in their assessment of revenue recognition, including accounting for revenue on an individual contract basis. Revenue from a contract is recognised over time as the services are rendered based on either a fixed price or hourly rate. This is described further in the accounting policies above.

The application of IFRS 15 has not had a significant impact on the financial position and/or financial performance of the Group.

Retirement benefits

The company operates a defined contribution scheme. The amount charged to profit and loss in respect of pension costs and other post retirement benefits is the contributions payable in the year. Differences between contributions payable in the year and contributions actually paid are shown as either accruals or prepayments in the balance sheet.

Leases

All leases are “operating leases” and the annual rentals are charged to profit and loss on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Rent free periods or other incentives received for entering into a lease are accounted for over the period of the lease so as to spread the benefit received over the lease term.

Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument, and are offset only when the company currently has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Financial assets

Trade receivables

Trade receivables which are due within one year and which do not constitute a financing transaction are initially measured at the transaction price. Trade receivables are subsequently measured at amortised cost, being the transaction price less any amounts settled and any impairment losses. Where the arrangement with a trade receivable constitutes a financing transaction, the financial asset is initially and subsequently measured at the present value of future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

A provision for impairment of trade receivables is established when there is objective evidence that the amounts due will not be collected according to the original terms of the contract. Impairment losses are recognised in profit or loss for the excess of the carrying value of the trade receivable over the present value of the future cash flows discounted using the original effective interest rate.

Subsequent reversals of an impairment loss that objectively relate to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised, are recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Financial liabilities and equity

Financial instruments are classified as liabilities and equity instruments according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the company after deducting all of its liabilities.

Equity instruments

Financial instruments classified as equity instruments are recorded at the fair value of the cash or other resources received or receivable, net of direct costs of issuing the equity instruments.

Trade payables

Trade payables due within one year that do not constitute a financing transaction are initially measured at the transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost, being the transaction price less any amounts settled.

Where the arrangement with a trade payable constitutes a financing transaction, the financial liability is initially and subsequently measured at the present value of future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar instrument.

3. Key assumptions and accounting estimates and significant judgements

The company makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. There are no estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

16. Contingent liabilities

The company is included in a group registration for VAT purposes and is therefore jointly and severally liable for all other group companies' unpaid debts in this connection. Other group companies' VAT balances at 31 December 2018 resulted in a contingent liability of £210,819 (2017: £nil).

17. Pension commitments

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme whose assets are held separately from those of the company in an independently administered fund. The pension charge represents contributions payable by the company and amounted to £134,791 (2017: £126,884). At the year end pension contributions outstanding amounted to £16,487 (2017: £17,642).

18. Immediate and ultimate parent company

The immediate parent company is Nucleus Holdings Limited. Both companies are incorporated in England and Wales.

Nucleus Holdings Limited, registered at Admiral House, 76-78 Old Street, London, EC1V 9AZ, is the parent undertaking of the smallest and largest group for which group accounts are drawn up.

19. Controlling party

The ultimate controlling party in the year was Dr S Cameron, a director of the company, by virtue of his controlling interest in Nucleus Holdings Limited.
